

Highways

The speed limit on the state's interstate highways is 65 miles per hour (104 kilometers per hour), unless otherwise posted.

On other highways and roads, speed limits are as posted.

While most non-U.S. driver's licenses are acceptable, it is best to bring an international driver's license.

The Eastern New Hampshire Turnpike, the F. E. Everett Turnpike, and the Spaulding Turnpike are toll roads. Tolls range from \$1.00 to \$3.00.

In New Hampshire, children under 18 years old traveling in motor vehicles must be either in a car safety seat or restrained by a seat belt. Drivers and all passengers are encouraged to wear seat belts.

CURRENCY

The U.S. dollar is the only accepted unit of currency in most New Hampshire businesses. Currency can be exchanged at any major bank in New Hampshire. ATMs (Automated Teller Machines) are numerous throughout the state. Most belong to international networks, so international visitors can access their funds at home.

SHOPPING

No Sales Tax ~ Throughout the state you will find everything from factory outlet stores to boutiques, antique shops, arts and crafts galleries, and a full spectrum of shops with local, domestic and international goods.

New Hampshire liquor stores are state-owned and offer some of the best prices found anywhere. Travelers should be advised that they are responsible for knowing regulations about the quantities of liquor they are allowed to transport out of the state. International visitors are encouraged to check with their local officials for customs regulations about transporting purchased goods back to their country.

MISCELLANEOUS

Drinking Age & Limits ~ The legal age for drinking alcoholic beverages in New Hampshire is 21 years of age. Proof of age is often required. Additionally, the state has a drinking and driving law that limits blood alcohol content to .08.

TIME ZONE

New Hampshire is on Eastern Standard Time (EST), five hours behind Greenwich Mean Time. From April to October, clocks are advanced one hour for Daylight Saving Time (DST).

CLIMATE

One of New Hampshire's most appealing features is its diverse climate. Summers are warm and sunny, with average daytime temperatures in the 70's (21.1 degrees Celsius) and, on some days, reaching into the 90's (32.2 degrees Celsius). Summer nights are generally cool. Fall is considered by many New Englanders to be the ideal season, with sunny days averaging a refreshing 50°F (10 degrees Celsius). Winter snowfalls average 63 to 90 inches (160.02-228.60 centimeters), and temperatures range from 15-40°F (-9.4 – 4.4 degrees Celsius). Because coastal breezes and higher elevations in the mountains can make even summer days quite cool, layers of clothing are advisable.


